Resurrection Garden

"Jesus said, "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live." – *John 11:25*

Last year, when we realized that our Easter service would not look like normal, our Easter flower order was cancelled and the monies given were set aside to bring forth flowers in the future. As the months went on and as we pondered how these flowers may manifest, an idea blossomed from within the Diaconate. A resurrection garden, I'll call it! And so, with bulbs purchased from the Easter flower money, Susan Kubler and Linda Winterberg began to plant in the flower beds that line the front of our church. These bulbs went in the ground and disappeared from our sight. Through the fall and the winter, they were simply buried waiting to burst forth.

In some ways, as they laid beneath the soil, I forgot about them. That was until the Saturday before Palm Sunday, as I stood out front with two members of the Diaconate handing out palms to driving-by parishioners. On that day, I realized that something was beginning to grow as green sprouts began to dot the dark soil. As we were preparing to begin Holy Week which takes us to the empty tomb, a resurrection was beginning to happen right outside our church doors!



Earth Day comes around again, just like the earth revolving around the sun. We can all do our part by planting native pollinator-friendly plants/shrubs in our yards. Earth Day seeds for a garden-friendly, monarch necessary, milkweed plant will be available at Sunday services starting on April 18, and in the church office. For more information about the importance of planting these in your garden check out www.saveourmonarchs.org.

The tried and true hints remain:

- Replace plastics in the home with long-lasting options (glass refrigerator containers instead of plastic).
- Bring your own shopping bags to markets.
- Bring your own reusable cup when purchasing beverages.
- Get a stainless steel, glass, or bamboo straw if you need one to drink your beverages at restaurants.
- Buy a filtering pitcher and trusty food-grade water bottle to use instead of buying water in plastic ones. (BONUS: It is cheaper in the long run.)
- Choose clothing and other personal items made from earth-friendly materials instead
 of microfibers and other synthetic fibers, which pollute our water. How, you ask? Every time you wash an item microscopic "stuff" washes out of the fabric and into the water system.
- Make your own reusable market bags, or buy them from the Organ Society table at Summerfest. Try this quick idea for a "10 minute" no-sew bag from a T-shirt (I think it would take me longer than 10 minutes to tie all the cute knots but well worth it and a good use for one of those "been there, done that, bought the T-shirt" T-shirts). Organ Society Special Presentation April 22

Rev. Char Corbett ({astor at Second Congregational Church in Newcastle) will join the Organ Society's meeting at 10am on April 22. Her presentation will feature a slideshow about her recent trips to Puerto Rico to help repair homes after Hurricane Maria devasted the island in 2018. She will show highlights of what work has been done by the volunteers; what the remaining needs are; and their hopes for continuing to share our love, support and care of our Puerto Rican brothers and sisters.

This is a joint project of MEUCC, UCC Disaster Ministries and Iglesia Evangelica Unida de Puerto Rico.

CWS Kit Program

The CWS committee is pleased that we are able to resume our Kit Program at this time. You may remember that we were in the midst of this last Spring when churches had to close so we had to put the Program on hold. We have been notified that Woodfords Church in Portland will be accepting kits again in early May.

These kits bring hope to our neighbors around the world who are fleeing violence, rebuilding after disasters, are homeless, or unable to get the school supplies needed to learn.

Because we have many items on hand that were donated last year, below is a list of what is needed to complete 6 hygiene kits and 5 emergency clean-up buckets. You can also donate additional complete school or hygiene kits; or if you don't want to shop, you can donate the monetary equivalent for a kit: hygiene kits, \$15 value; school kits, \$15 value; or emergency clean-up buckets, \$75 value with a check made out to First Congregational Church with CWS kits (specify school, hygiene, or clean-up bucket) in the memo. Please go to cwskits.org for more information about items needed for each kit or call Nancy Roby (phone # below).

Here is the list of what is needed to complete what is on hand:

Hygiene Kits:

- 6 hand towels
- 6 WIDE tooth combs, with at least 6" of teeth
- 6 fingernail or toenail clippers, either is acceptable

Clean-Up Buckets:

- 3 large sponges
- 16 regular sponges
- 2 sets of 18 reusable, lightweight cleaning towels, like Handiwipes
- 150 oz (or 2-25oz) bottle of liquid laundry detergent
- 3 16-28 oz bottles of liquid dish soap
- 1 12-17 oz bottle of household cleaner that can be mixed with water (no spray bottles)
- 2 pkgs of 48-50 clothespins
- 1 100' clothesline
- 4 pair of heavy duty waterproof dishwashing gloves (latex free)
- 2 sets of 24-28 heavy duty or contractor type 30-45 gallon trash bags on a roll
- 2 6-9oz bottles of non-aerosol insect repellent

Pastoral Relations — Josh's Sabbatical Leave Coming in 2022

What is a Sabbatical leave? After a certain amount of time, specified in a pastor's call agreement, a pastor can take a Sabbatical leave from the work of ministry for rest, travel and/or research. According to Josh's call, after five years as our pastor, he is eligible to take a Sabbatical leave of three months. As of March 1, 2022, Josh will have been with us for five years.

A small committee has been appointed by the Church Council, working to apply for the Lilly Endowment National Clergy Renewal Program. This subcommittee consists of Joan Shea, Pastoral Relations Chair, Sarah Whitfield, Diaconate Chair, and Deb Olson, Trustee. If we are accepted into this program, Josh will be given an amount of money to help him plan for a rewarding Sabbatical.

While Josh is on Sabbatical, the church will also be given money from the Lilly Endowment to help cover the costs of hiring a supply minister. Tentatively, this leave will take place mid-August to mid-November of 2022. During this three-month period, the theme that will be guiding Josh's Sabbatical will also guide our congregation's life during that time.

At the end of three months, Josh will return refreshed and ready to start up again, and we will welcome him back with open arms. He will share with us his experience; we will share ours with him; and we will journey forward in ministry together!

The details of his Sabbatical are not yet finalized as a lot of these details will depend on the grant from the Lilly Endowment. But we are hopeful that our church will be accepted into this program to benefit Josh and our congregation.
